CSI in the ED: What the Emergency Nurse Needs to Know

Presenter: Rae Wooten, BSN, RN, F-ABMDI and Laura Gallagher, PhD, MSN, APRN, CNS-BC, CEN

Objectives: Identify forensic findings during active participation in simulated skill stations. Define what constitutes evidence collection and chain of custody. Identify indices of suspicion and subsequent reporting, what and to whom?

This is an all-day (6 hour) didactic/interactive session on what the Emergency Nurse needs to know from a Forensic point of view. Rae Wooten, who served as our Charleston County Coroner for 25+ years, is our content expert in the field of Forensics. She is also a RN who understands the demands of Emergency Nursing. The morning sessions are the didactic portion of the course and the afternoon sessions are the interactive stations where each team will work together to solve the puzzle of the patient who presents (or is "dropped off") at the ED. Based on specific findings, coupled with the high index of suspicion gleaned from the morning's didactic portion, the team will document their findings and report during the final debrief session. We will also talk about documentation as it relates to the legalities of specific cases.
